## **SNEAKERS**

Sneakers started out as gym and sports s oes. 'Sneaker' is American slang – kids started calling them this because the rubber soles meant you could sneak about quietly. And sneakers still have rubber soles today! These sports shoes made their debut in England in the nineteenth century as croquet shoes that had a flexible rubber sole and canvas upper. In those days, only wealthy aristocrats had the leisure time for running and ball games. To have footwear tailor-made for this purpose was a sign of wealth and sophistication. The new rubber soles were considered especially refined and modern at the time.



Nowadays a sneaker's not just a gym shoe, but also a shoe for everyday life. The breakout success of the sneaker began in the 1950s, when James Dean let himself be photographed wearing these shoes again and again. As a result of this, wearing sneakers became foremost an anti-fashion statement, especially in subcultural circles. By wearing sneakers, young people openly displayed their opposition to the establishment – to bourgeois society.

Today sneakers are fashionable and come in a huge variety of styles. You can buy them in all imaginable colors and models, from countless different manufacturers and brands, for men and women, for kids and even babies. Over time they've turned into a status symbol and a sign of belonging to a certain social group, with specific brands and labels defining the trends.

These twelve designs – running shoes, tennis shoes, basketball hightops, etc. – are unlabelled and unbranded. They're sneakers with neither logo nor status... it's completely up to you how to color LABBE them in!
