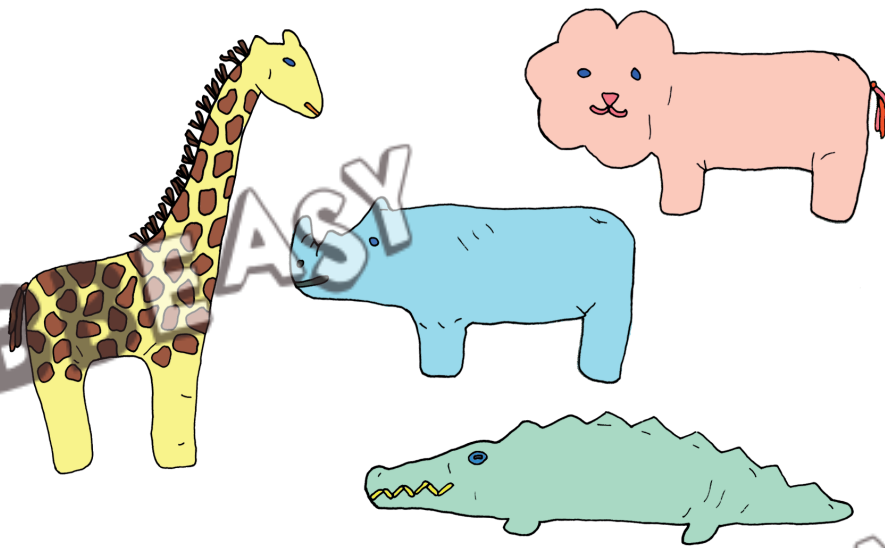

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HOW TO MAKE IT

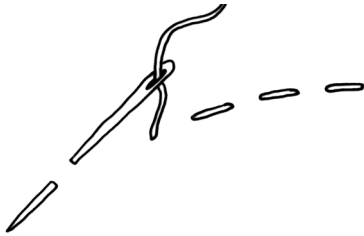

MATERIALS NEEDED

- Scissors
- Glue for paper
- Felt tip pen
- Pins
- Thread
- Sewing needle
- Fabric (lion/rhino: 2 pieces each 12 x 17 in [30 x 42 cm], crocodile: 2 pieces each 21 x 10 in [54 x 25 cm], giraffe: 2 pieces each 15 x 20 in [38 x 50 cm])
- Optional: buttons, wool, fabric scraps, embroidery thread, fabric pens, etc. for your own designs

BASIC STITCHES

BASTING STITCH



Use the basting stitch to sew two layers of fabric together. To do so, sew in one direction, up - down - up - down. Leave a small space between each stitch.

OVERLOCK STITCH



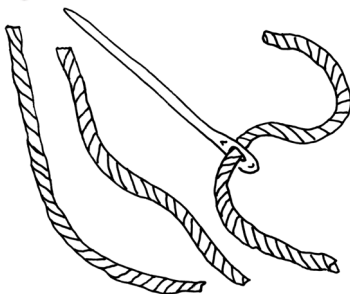
Use the overlock stitch to sew two edges together or close openings after stuffing an item. Sew from one side to another at small intervals.

BACKSTITCH



Use the backstitch to sew a continuous line. To do so, stick the needle behind the last stitch and bring it back up from underneath, now in front of the stitch.

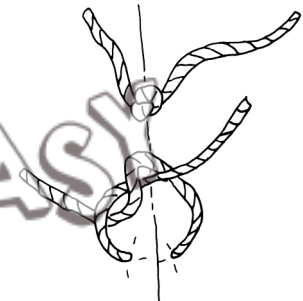
MANES & TAILS FROM WOOL



Cut several threads of wool of approximately the same length. Thread one onto a sewing needle.



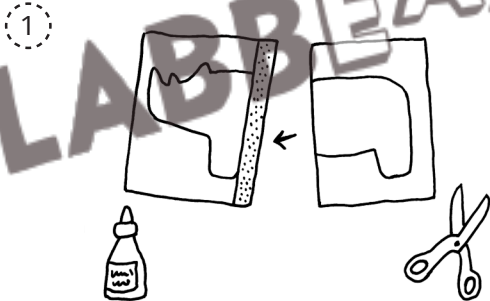
Stick the needle through the fabric where you want it and pull the needle through until one end of the wool is on each side.



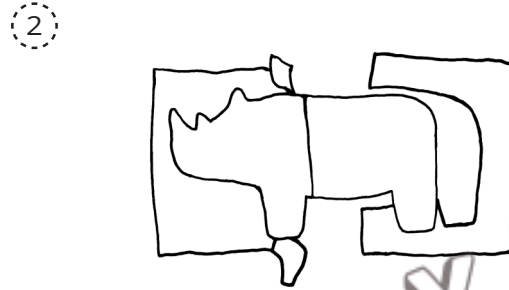
Pull out the needle and knot the two ends of wool together.

HOW TO MAKE IT

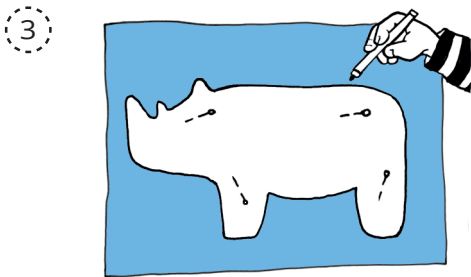

Cut the pattern sheets along the dotted lines and glue the pieces together at the shaded areas.

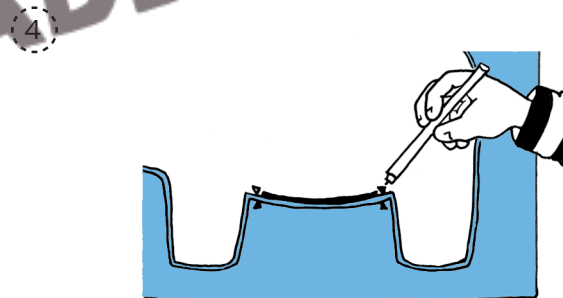


Now cut out the glued pattern along the solid line.

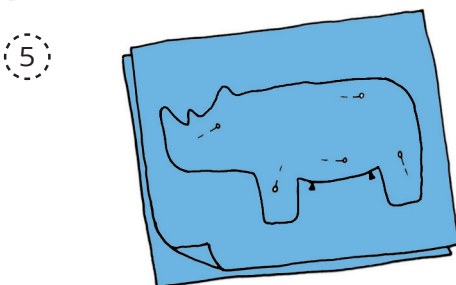


Cut two pieces of fabric the same size:
Lion/rhino: each 12 x 17 in (30 x 42 cm)
Crocodile: each 21 x 10 in (54 x 25 cm)
Giraffe: each 15 x 20 in (38 x 50 cm)

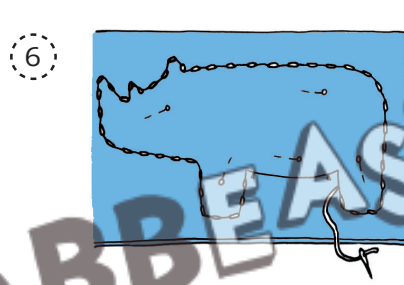
Center the pattern on the back of one piece of fabric and secure it with 2-3 pins to keep it in place. Outline the shape with a felt tip pen to create the sewing line.



Also mark the opening onto the fabric. Remove the pins and remove the pattern from the fabric.



Place the two pieces of fabric exactly on top of each other so the right sides of the fabric both face inward and the sewing line you drew is on the outside. Pin the two pieces of fabric together with a few pins or safety pins.



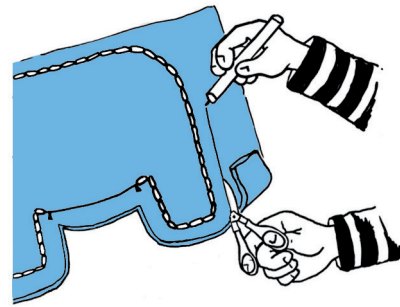
Now it's time to sew:
Important:
Leave the space between the two markings open for filling later.

Option 1:
Using a sewing machine, sew the two pieces of fabric together along the line you drew with a straight stitch. So the seam doesn't come loose, sew 3 stitches backwards at the beginning and 3 stitches backwards at the end.

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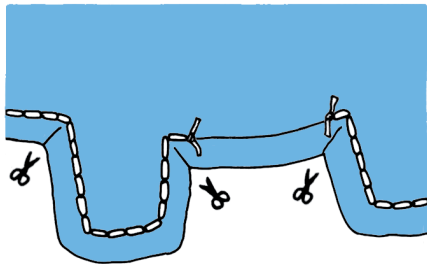


Option 2:

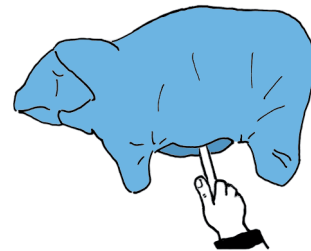
Sew the two pieces of fabric together by hand using a basting stitch along the line you drew. Go over the line again with another basting stitch to create a closed seam. Knot the ends of the thread.

Using a felt tip pen, draw a line about 0.5 in (1-2 cm) around the seam and cut along it to cut off the excess fabric.

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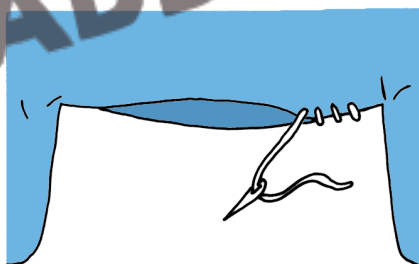

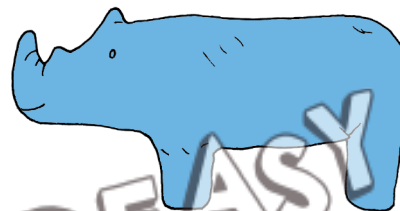
Carefully cut all the corners as shown in the picture so it's easier to turn inside out and it doesn't get wrinkles. Be careful not to cut into the seam.

Turn the doll inside out so that the right side of the fabric is on the outside. To help you do this, you can use a pencil or spoon handle. Fill the doll with stuffing or fabric scraps through the opening.

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Fold the fabric at the opening inward and sew it closed by hand with an overlock stitch. Knot and sew up the ends of the thread.

If you like, you can give the doll a face. Embroider or sew on eyes, a mouth and a nose. You can make funny faces with buttons or beads.
