INTRODUCTION

About Line Patterned Eggs

Our brain doesn't like surprises, and therefore we prefer uniform repetitions like graphic patterns that have a consistent structure.

Because the brain processes patterns quickly and with little effort, children can recognize patterns quickly and have no difficulty drawing or tracing them. When drawing on an entire sheet of paper, however, they would quickly lose track- where should they start and where should they stop? A clearly defined area for drawing eliminates this issue- for a beginner, the smaller the drawing area, the better.



With this in mind, these worksheets contain egg shapes to draw in in four different sizes: 2 in (5 cm), 3 in (7 cm), 4 in (11 cm), and 8 in (21 cm) high. In addition, there are 48 original pattern ideas for tracing, which you can decorate the blank eggs with. The linear patterns are composed of various types, such as wiggly, straight, grooved, cracked and delicate lines, plus more.

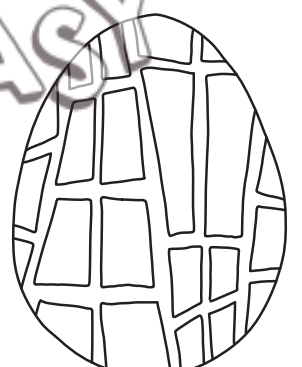
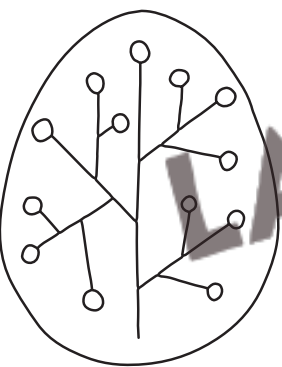
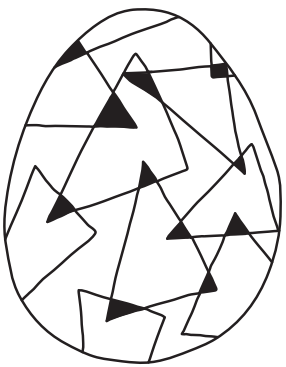
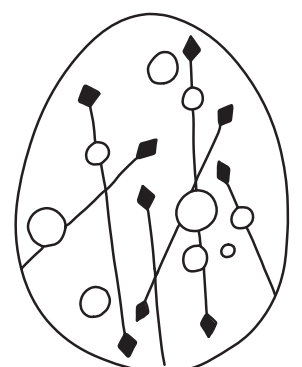
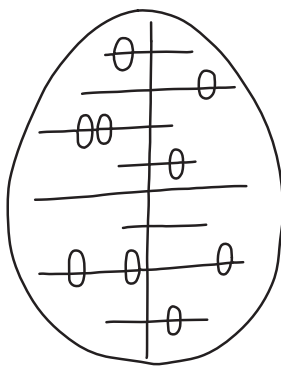
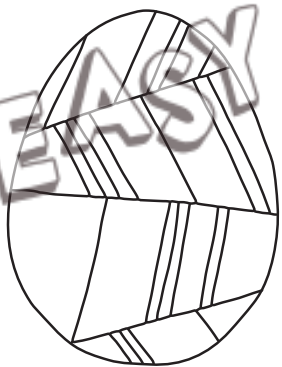
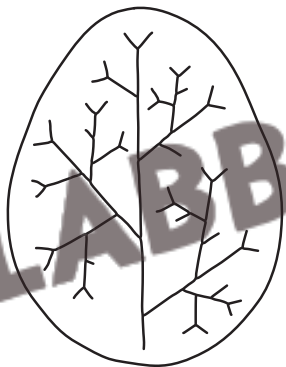
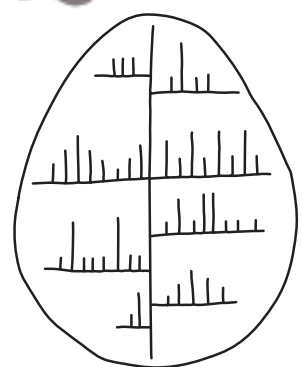
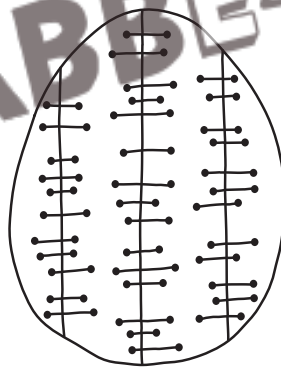
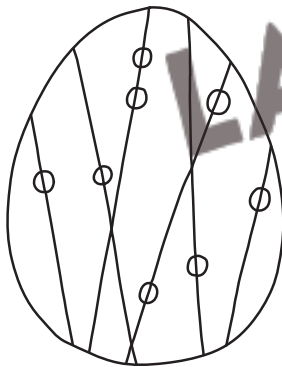
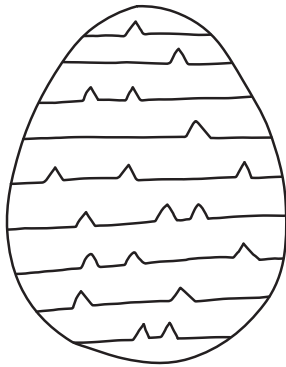
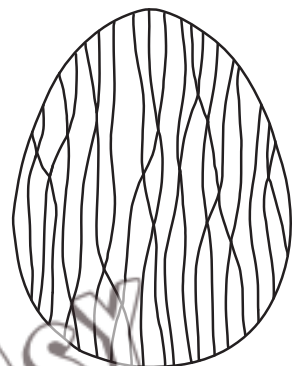
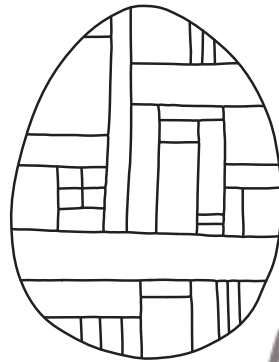
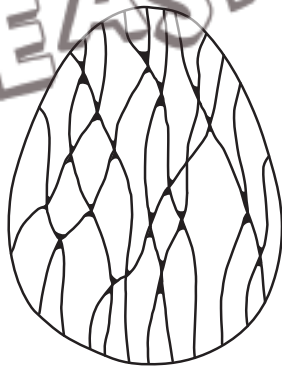
Drawing these simple lines and curves requires good fine motor skills. Like all techniques with pencils, drawing must be practiced, practiced and practiced again... On the margin of a student's drawing, the following note was found from the great master Michelangelo (1475-1564): "Draw, Antonio, draw, Antonio, draw and lose no time!" This is still true today.

For drawing, it's best to use pencils, crayons or even markers or felt-tip pens with a fine tip. For the little ones, this material also offers eight large and eight giant pre-drawn eggs to color.
